– "Woe" - 6th woe of 6 (Is 28:1; 29:1,15; 30:1; 31:1; 33:1)

- The "spoiler" here is Sennacherib, who came against Jerusalem during the reign of Hezekiah (Is 36-37)

— This also applies to the final "spoiler." Note the prayer...

- Keeping promises: Alludes to covenant Hezekiah made with Assyria to be left alone (2 Kings 18:18ff)

- "...he has broken the covenant" - Sennacherib, in a local sense, yet also applies in a broader sense to the Coming World Leader

- The most beautiful regions will be withered away...

— Lebanon - Leban = white; northern mountains, 120 miles of snow covered with cedars and firs)

— Sharon - foot of Mt Carmel to Shefelah, known for flowers and forests

— Carmel - divides Sharon from Eschaelon, the rocky hills

— Bashan - trans-Jordan upland from Hermon to Gilead with high plains, forests of Oak and known for wild cattle. Idiomatically describing the desolation to come.

The Security of the Remnant

- "...impregnable rock" - describes the place of refuge for the believing remnant after the abomination of desolation (Cf. Matt 24:15f; Rev 12:6f); implies that this location will be easy to defend

Since the context is dealing with end time events, this passage also points out a distinction between the apostates and the Faithful Remnant as far as their protection and preservation is concerned. The means by which protection for the Remnant will be accomplished is given in v16. Beside reaffirming the promise mentioned in Is 41:17-20 and 65:8-16 that food and water would be provided, this passage gives some insight as to the nature of the hiding place itself.

The State of Government

- This verse was referenced in our founding documents as the template for our three branches of government

- "...the LORD is our judge" - judicial branch

- "...The LORD is our lawgiver" - legislative branch

- "...The LORD is our king" - executive branch

- Our founding fathers recognized that every person has a sin nature (Cf. Gen 8:21), including those in government office. They recognized that the only Person who could occupy more than one office, let alone all three, is Someone without a sin nature.

- Then, our founding fathers recognized that this horizontal separation of government into three branches was not enough. Government also needed to be separated vertically, so they created state governments.
- State governments were originally set up to hold the most amount of power because they were the government entity closest to the people
- Then they began thinking that even this horizontal and vertical separation of powers was still not enough to stop tyranny, so they came up with a Bill of Rights, the first 10 amendments to the Constitution.
- This Bill of Rights articulated rights that people have that come from God. They were meant to be a set of handcuff on tyrannical human government and their ruling over the people.
